SUBJECT: Draft 2017 – 2022 Local Hazard Mitigation Plan Update

### RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the City Council provide input on the draft 2017 – 2022 Local Hazard Mitigation Plan Update.

#### **BACKGROUND**

The Disaster Mitigation Act of 2000 (DMA 2000) required all communities to establish a Local Hazard Mitigation Plan (LHMP) as a condition to receive federal hazard mitigation funding through the Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP), Pre-Disaster Mitigation Grant Program (PDM), and the Flood Management Assistance Grant Program (FMA). In addition, as part of the DMA 2000, the LHMP must be updated every 5 years.

#### DISCUSSION

The City's original Local Hazard Mitigation Plan was approved by FEMA in December 2009. Since the publishing of the 2009 LHMP, FEMA increased the requirements for any Local Hazard Mitigation Plan update adding five (5) key elements that must be included in every LHMP and they are:

Element A: Planning Process

Element B: Hazard Identification and Risk Assessment

Element C: Mitigation Strategy

Element D: Plan Review, Evaluation and Implementation

Element E: Plan Adoption

Element F: Additional State Requirements

## **Planning Process**

FEMA desires the LHMP to be a community plan with public involvement every step of the way. To that end, in March of 2015, the City published a Local Hazard Community Survey to obtain the community's input on local hazards and mitigation ideas. Members of the community were solicited to be part of the planning team. Three (3) Public Workshops were held in May 2016 and the LHMP Update was recently presented at the City's various Community Advisories Committees for public and committee input and comments.

### **Hazard Identification and Risk Assessment**

The LHMP Update Planning Team was made up of City staff, a representative from Alameda County Fire, and two members of the community. The planning team met 7 times over a year and half and identified nine (9) hazards (natural and man-made) to be included in the plan update and those were:

- 1) Earthquakes
- 2) Hazardous Materials Release
- 3) Climate Change
- 4) Fire
- 5) Floods
- 6) Civil Unrest
- 7) Utility/Infrastructure Failure
- 8) Terrorism
- 9) Biological Threats

The LHMP Update includes an in-depth analysis of the risks to the City associated with each of the hazards listed above.

## **Mitigation Strategy**

The planning team brainstormed mitigation ideas to be included in the plan update. The team evaluated each proposed mitigation ideas for feasibility, social benefits, economic benefits, environmental improvement and community objectives. 44 mitigation ideas were identified for inclusion and were prioritized by the team into High, Medium and Low Priorities, with some items categorized as long range ideas or already in progress.

## **High Priority**

- 1. Building a bioswale
- 2. Earthquake Warning System for Fire Station Doors
- 3. Mass Notification System
- 4. Working with EBMUD
- Police Substation
- 6. Caltrans Agreement
- 7. Deescalating techniques
- 8. Recovery Plan for Cyberterrorism
- 9. Public Address System for the Peninsula for Tsunamis
- 10. Evacuation Route signs for Peninsula and City as a whole
- 11. Revamping our CERT program
- 12. Train Staff
- 13. Moving critical services to a more secure location
- 14. Fee waiver for Earthquake retrofit projects on single family homes (Braces & Bolts)
- 15. Revamping City Web Page
- 16. Creating a listing of Laboratories in the City and their potential issues

## **Medium Priority**

- 17. Storm drain cleaning
- 18. Increasing earthquake awareness in the community
- 19. Providing Tsunami information to retail, hotel and restaurant establishments
- 20. Undergrounding utilities
- 21. Leveraging our relationship with Berkeley's Office of Emergency Services
- 22. Becoming a POD (Point of Distribution) for both Commodity and medical services
- 23. Establishing a Medical Reserve Corps

### **Low Priority**

- 24. Gas shut off valves (PG&E)
- 25. Working with the Red Cross to install smoke detectors in single family homes
- 26. Providing public disposal sites for batteries & oil
- 27. Providing "Treegators" for residents
- 28. Transfer Tax (a % rebated to the homebuyer for earthquake retrofitting)
- 29. Requiring gas shut off valves for all remodels
- 30. Film on windows of City Hall for energy efficiency and to prevent shattering
- 31. Encourage renewables for businesses by giving tax breaks or rebates

### Long Range Ideas/Already in Process

- 32. Building levees (Regional for Sea Level Rise) Long Range
- 33. Designating the Senior Center as a cooling center Already Done
- 34. Drought Landscaping Ordinance Already Done
- 35. GIS Maps of Hazardous Pipelines in the City for use in the EOC Already Doing
- 36. Offer GIS Mapping online Long Range
- 37. Restoration /Buildup of Wetlands against Sea Level Rise Long Range/Regional
- 38. Wind/Windmills Already in Process
- 39. Community Policing Already Doing
- 40. Update Flood Plain Being Done by FEMA
- 41. Convert 4 track lines to main lines Long Range
- 42. Work with Carrollton College to provide services during a pandemic Long Range
- 43. Alternative Transportation (BikeShare) Already Doing
- 44. Smart Grid

# Plan Review and Evaluation and Implementation

The Local Hazard Mitigation Plan is considered a living document. The Emergency Services Coordinator will monitor, evaluate and update the plan every five (5) years. They will also be responsible for engaging with outside stakeholders to ensure plan implementation is ongoing and is achieving its stated purpose and goals. The City will utilize social media updates such as the City website, Twitter, and Facebook to inform the community of any updates and mitigation action progress.

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## **Plan Adoption**

The City will submit the Local Hazard Mitigation Plan Update to the State and FEMA for approval. Once approved, the plan will be brought before Council for adoption.
