11. PUBLIC HEARINGS

11.1. <u>ID-2019-037</u>

Resolution Of The City Council Of The City Of Emeryville Granting A Waiver From The Noise Ordinance To EAH Housing And J.H. Fitzmaurice, Inc. For Saturday Work From February 23, 2019 Through August 10, 2019 Between The Hours Of 9:00 A.M. And 5:00 P.M. For Work With Hand Tools And Mixers For Paint, Texture, And Stucco At 3706 San Pablo Avenue (APN: 49-951-8 and -9) (CEQA Status: Exempt Pursuant To State CEQA Guidelines Section 15061(b)(3)). (Charles S. Bryant / Navarre Oaks)

Assistant Planner Navarre Oaks gave the staff presentation and

responded to Council Member questions.

The applicant team, comprised of Ethan Daniels, EAH Housing, and Kyan Hakimi and John Dominguez, J.H. Fitzmaurice, were also present for questions and to outline the reasons for the waiver request.

PUBLIC HEARING OPEN: 7:28 p.m.

- 1. Naomi Mazy, a nearby resident, spoke in opposition to the noise waiver being granted, and added that the fumes created by the project were a problem, not only the noise, and affected her health. She also provided a letter from her housemate, Thomas E. Smith, to enter into the record.
- 2. Bettie Marquis DeShay, a nearby resident, spoke in opposition to the noise waiver being granted, stating that an additional day per week of construction noise would be too much of a burden, and cited health concerns of her family members.
- 3. Andre Carpiaux stated that the claims of the speakers were exaggerated.

The applicant team noted that the project was registered LEED Platinum, and stated that no chemicals were being emitted. They offered to redirect construction vehicle traffic on Saturdays to mitigate any fumes generated by entering and leaving the site. Regarding the second speaker, it was stated that anyone with damages from the previous stucco applications would be reimbursed.

John Dominguez, the Project Superintendent, stated that there was no painting occurring at this time, and reiterated that they have an open door policy to accept complaints.

12.1. <u>ID-2019-038</u>

Resolution Of The City Council Of The City Of Emeryville Adopting A Framework For Paid Parking In The North Hollis And Triangle Areas (CEQA Determination: Exempt Pursuant To CEQA Guidelines Section 15301(c)). (Charles S. Bryant / Chadrick Smalley / Amber Evans)

Community and Economic Development Coordinator Amber Evans gave the staff presentation and responded to Council Member questions.

PUBLIC COMMENT

- 1. Ron Silberman read aloud a letter from Townhouse Restaurant Manager Jeffrey Kroeber, which stated opposition to the meters planned near the business, citing the negative impact it would have on his workers. Mr. Silberman then gave his own remarks related to the east side of Doyle, asking from whom the request for meters had come.
- 2. Geoffrey Sears, President of Emeryville TMA, spoke in support of getting people out of cars and into transit, and stated that free parking does not help that effort. He added that the TMA would like all of Hollis to be parking-controlled, to make it a more efficient transit corridor.
- 3. Jennifer Kain, Wareham Development, spoke in favor of the addition of metered parking, stated that a hazardous condition exists with the current lack of enforcement, and requested that meters located under the Powell Street overpass be added to the plan.
- 4. Andre Carpiaux spoke about the lack of parking near the Senior Center, stating that something should be done to alleviate the shortage.
- 5. Nasser Azimi, East Bay Therapeutics, stated that his customers have difficulty parking near his business, and urged the implementation of metered parking.

- Bobby Lee spoke in support of the ordinance, and offered suggested language additions/revisions.

Council discussion ensued, and staff was directed to make revisions and bring the ordinance back for a new first reading and introduction at the March 19, 2019 meeting.
