PUBLIC COMMENT

- Jason Kelly, Electronic Frontier Foundation, asked for Council support in discussion and prohibition of facial recognition technology.
- 2. Brian Hofer, Executive Director of Secure Justice, highlighted that the United Nations called for a moratorium on facial recognition technology and discussed the work of his organization.
- 3. Tim Kingston, criminal defense investigator, voiced his concern about facial recognition technology and its misidentification of women and people of color.
- 4. Salahi Bakri commented that the use of facial recognition technology reminded him of the film "Minority Report" and stated that the use of the technology would hurt democracy by eroding privacy.

Council directed staff to research a city-wide ban on acquisition and direct-use of facial recognition technology, a policy for data obtained by third parties, and to review ordinances from the cities of San Francisco, Oakland, and Berkeley.

13. DEPARTMENT HEAD REPORTS

City Manager Daniel provided a brief report on Public Works Department.

14. FUTURE AGENDA ITEM REQUESTS FROM COUNCIL MEMBERS

Council Member Martinez requested and received Council support for the Sustainability Committee to look into ways to incentivize multi-family homes to install EV chargers. She also requested a report regarding legislative matters. City Manager Daniel advised that a report would be given sometime in the fall.

Mayor Medina requested the discussion of a new Gilman Field JPA be agendized. The City Council supported the request.
